

The Next Step: Request for Waiver of College Application Fees

If you plan to enter college in the 2010-11 academic year and you have used a fee waiver to register for the SAT or SAT Subject Tests, you can ask your counselor for up to four Request for Waiver of College Application Fee forms. You should only send the forms with your college applications, and only to institutions listed in the *2010-11 Directory of Colleges Cooperating with the SAT Fee-Waiver Service*. The directory is available online at sat.collegeboard.com/register/sat-fee-waivers.

Note: The institutions listed in the directory are not obligated to waive their application fees.

If the college of your choice is not listed in the directory, check the website of the institution for additional details and resources. You may also want to ask your counselor to write a letter (on your school's letterhead) that explains your circumstances. Enclose a copy of the letter with your application.

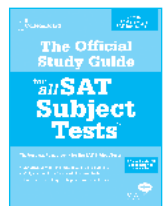

Guidelines for Families

The College Board offers assistance to students for whom payment of SAT® and SAT Subject Tests™ fees may be a barrier to testing and applying for college. If you think your family may qualify for SAT fee waivers, please work with your school counselor or an authorized agency to determine if you are eligible to receive fee waivers.

Fee-Waiver Eligibility

To be eligible for a fee waiver, you must be a high school student who:

- Is an 11th- or 12th-grade student, if taking the SAT.
- Is a ninth- through 12th-grade student, if taking the SAT Subject Tests.
- Is either a United States citizen or is testing in the U.S. or U.S. territories.
- Meets one or more of the following requirements:
 - Is enrolled in a free or reduced-price lunch program.
 - Is enrolled in a program for the economically disadvantaged (for example, AVID or a TRIO program such as Upward Bound).
 - Family’s annual income falls within the levels listed by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) for free or reduced-price lunches (see below).
 - Family receives public assistance.
 - Family lives in federally subsidized public housing.
 - Is a resident in a foster home.

USDA Food and Nutrition Service Income Eligibility Guidelines

You can determine your eligibility for fee waivers by checking the income guidelines set by the United States Department of Agriculture for the National School Lunch Program.

Note: At the time of this printing the guidelines for the 2010 school year were not available. To see the 2010-11 guidelines, go to www.fns.usda.gov/cnd/ and select “**Income Eligibility**” or see your counselor.

1. The household size should be the number of household members plus the filer on the family’s current tax statement. A student who is in foster care is considered a household size of one person.
2. Income levels are based on the USDA Food and Nutrition Service Income Eligibility Guidelines used by schools, institutions and facilities participating in the National School Lunch Program.

More than six members in the household?

To determine income levels for families with more than six household members, take the annual allowance for six members (\$54,631) and add \$6,919 for each additional member.

How to Get a Fee Waiver

Fee waivers are distributed based on the eligibility guidelines noted above. See your authorized agency or school counselor to obtain a waiver. If you are a home-schooled student, you will need to provide proof of eligibility (tax records, public assistance records or record of enrollment in an aid program) to a high school counselor in your area.

Once your counselor determines that you are eligible, you can receive up to four fee-waiver cards. **You are eligible for only two SAT registrations and two SAT Subject Test registrations** (for example, you can’t use three fee waivers for the SAT and one for SAT Subject Tests).

Fee Waivers — the Tests and More

Fee waivers cover more than just the testing fees. When you register for the SAT or SAT Subject Tests, the fee waiver will cover:

- **The registration fee** for the SAT or SAT Subject Tests (covers the costs of up to three individual SAT Subject Tests taken on a single test day).
- **Four additional flexible score reports**, which you can order at no charge at any time after registering for the test(s), including after you have seen your scores. You are entitled to a total of four such reports regardless of how many fee waivers you use.
- **Question-and-Answer Service (QAS) or Student Answer Service (SAS)** if ordered at the time of registration. These two services help you be sure your scores are accurate by providing more information about the types of questions and how you answered them. (QAS and SAS aren’t available for SAT Subject Tests.)
- Up to **four Request for Waiver of College Application Fee forms** (see the information later in this pamphlet).
- **A \$40 discount off the regular price of The Official SAT Online Course™** when you register online using a fee waiver.
- **Any fees associated with registering internationally.**

Using Fee Waivers

You can use a fee waiver to register for either the SAT or the SAT Subject Tests. Talk to your counselor about registering for these tests and verifying that you qualify for a fee waiver. If you qualify for a fee waiver, you’ll get a card with a unique fee-waiver code to use for registration.

Online Registration

You can use a fee waiver to register online for the tests at sat.collegeboard.com/register. You will be asked to enter the following information from your card: the 12-digit code, the counselor’s name and the eligibility criteria you meet. You can use the fee-waiver code only once. Make sure to register by the regular deadline.

Paper Registration

To register by mail, complete the fee-waiver card and make sure you indicate your grade level in Item 6 and print the 12-digit fee-waiver code legibly in Item 19 on the registration form. Mail your completed registration form and card by the deadline (or, if testing at an international location, in time to be *received* by the deadline). All required fields on the card must be completed for it to be accepted as valid payment for test fees. Your registration will be returned unprocessed if the card is incomplete.

Important Registration Notes

- **Fee-waiver codes are good for only one registration.** If you register with a fee waiver and miss the test day, you cannot re-register with the same fee-waiver code. You can, however, go online or call Customer Service to transfer your registration to another test date (you will have to pay a change fee to do this).
- **Fee waivers may not be used for standby registration.**
- **Fee waivers may not be used for late registration, except for the October test.** Registrations with a fee waiver will be accepted until Sept. 24, 2010, for students testing in the United States or U.S. territories.
- **Test fees are not refundable**, even if you previously paid test fees that would have been covered by a fee waiver.

Test Day
